Methodology

Sample


- Survey fielded: July 2021
- Population investigated: Anyone who uses, contributes to, or thinks about open source software and is over 17 years old.
- Scope: Worldwide, with translated versions in Arabic, Chinese (simplified), French, German, Hindi, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, Russian, and Spanish. 89% of the usable responses came from the English questionnaires, 5% from the Spanish, and 3% from the German.
- Usable sample: 2,350. Overall, 3,192 participants answered 2 of the 3 initial questions, which included an age-related screening question. Cases with high levels of non-response were ultimately excluded from the sample.

Margin of Error (MoE) is +/- 3.1% with 90% confidence and +/- 2.6% with 95% confidence (N=2,350)




What best describes your location?







With which racial background(s) do you identify? If multiracial, check all that apply.




What is the highest level of formal education that you have completed? What is the highest level of formal education that either of your parents completed?




Which word best describes the area where you live? Which word best describes the area where you work?





Do you consider yourself to be gender non-conforming, gender diverse, gender variant, or gender expansive?




Do you consider yourself to be transgender?






What is your sexual orientation? (check all that apply)








To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statement? "I feel welcome in open source."






Have you ever experienced stereotyping based on perceived demographic characteristics directed at you in the context of an open source project?





To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statement? "People from different backgrounds have equal opportunities to participate in open source projects."




To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statement? "I feel that people from different backgrounds have an equal opportunity to be a part of the decision-making process within open source projects."




What is your preferred language?






How well can you read and write in English?









Have you felt like your identity has affected the ability to reach your goals when contributing to open source? For example, gaining the needed skills or networking with people?




Lack of participation affects goal achievement. On average, 30% believe their identity has had an impact on their ability to reach their goals when contributing to open source.

To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements?














Have you ever experienced any of the following behaviors directed at you in the context of an open source project?

Frequency of Behaviors Experienced in the Context of an Open Source **Project by Those That Do Not Feel Welcome in Open Source**






To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statement? "When I participate in open source, I trust that the code of conduct is enforced."





If you don't feel welcome, you also don't trust that the Code of Conduct is being enforced.


To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statement? When I participate in open source, I trust that the code of conduct is enforced."






Which best describes your employment (paid work) status?








Is open source taught as part of your school's curriculum?

Where are your efforts focused in open source participation and how often do you engage in those activities?






To what extent do you agree with this statement?

"Open source projects I work on have documentation that captures process documentation in addition to technical documentation?"




To what extent do you agree with this statement?





Have you had difficulty participating in an open source community because of tools used in an open source project?












The "At work" and "University" categories were added as a result of coding open-ended "other" responses.






Does your dis/ability affect how you work?

What are your pronouns?

Analysis of over a thousand open-ended responses indicates that usage of gender-neutral pronouns is not widespread in the open source community.

We looked at the results according to how respondents answered, "Do you consider yourself to be gender non-conforming, gender diverse, gender variant, or gender expansive?"

- The gender conforming respondents' pronouns typically conformed also. Seventy-one percent use a pronoun like "he / him / his" or "she / her / hers."
- Slightly fewer (61%) of those questioning their gender still named either a "he / him / his" or "she / her / hers" type formulation.
- Forty-five percent of gender non-conforming respondents describe their pronouns in the traditional manner. At the same time, 35% did provide an answer that purposefully mentioned "they" or "he and/or she" or some other combination seemingly as a means to be inclusive.
